



When you think 'mountaineering', you don't usually think Vanuatu. But the archipelago is home to one of the highest peaks in the Pacific, the mighty Mount Tabwemasana, which rises from the surrounding cloud forest and supplies most of the fresh water on Santo. Not many people actually summit Mount Tabwemasana (around 6 per year), but it can be done. Just make sure you arrive in the dry season (May to October), when the river crossings are possible. Be warned, it is a tough journey that takes around 10 hours hard trekking to basecamp at Kerepua village, then another 4 hours to the summit. You can organise guided tours through local Santo operator, Wrecks To Rainforest.

In the Island of Santo, a small spring flowed from a rocky outcropping at the base of the majestic Tabwemasana mountain.







In their canoes, some brought coconuts, others taro, and so on. As Roi Mata greeted his guests, he invited them to gather accordingly to what they had brought. "Coconuts with coconuts, taro with taro, and so on," he said.

"If you want peace," Roi Mata declared, "from now on consider allying accordingly to the groups made today. You now belong to a clan; your totem is what you have brought me. Ensure to marry outside your clan and offer generous gifts to all newlyweds and you will live in peace and harmony forever."

All the chiefs and warriors realized that this gathering and the wise instructions of Roi Mata were a unique opportunity to start a new era. To show their acceptance, they all respectfully deposited their weapons at the feet of Roi Mata.

Roi Mata became a legend and is still today considered the greatest king of Vanuatu.

It is said that when he passed away, so many people from all the islands wanted to pay their respects and thank him for his spiritual legacy. Thousands left their islands to honor him. No more canoes were available and many thought they would not be able to make it to the ceremony. However, something magical happened that day: the sea parted in two, allowing communities to safely walk back and forth to the Hat Islands to attend Roi Mata's

The sea's miraculous parting was seen as a testament to the impact Roi Mata had had on the people and the importance of his message of peace. To this day, his memory is revered and his teachings remembered, helping to maintain the harmony and unity that he worked so hard to establish.

How to get there

In July 2008, Chef Roi Mata's domain was formally registered a world heritage site - the first in Vanuat! Just half and hour's drive North of Port Vila and featuring a string of perfect beaches, a breathtaking hrabour, spectacular views of the Hat shaped island of Artok and so much more.

In a cultures where language is unwritten, oral traditions are faithfully passed down from generation to generation. The accuracy of such history is frequently disputed by Western cultures, for what is heard can be changed in the retelling. And in any case, how does one separate fact from legend? Throughout the middle and southern islands of Vanuatu there existed the story of a great and powerful man.



A legend from Ambae Island

The elderly women in Ambangga village had a secret way to regain their youth. They would walk to a well-known creek and dive into the water, passing through a narrow rock passage. The rough edges of the rock would scrape their skin, causing their wrinkles to smooth away like a molting snake. Once they emerged from the passage, they would be rejuvenated.

One day, a grandmother decided it was time for her to reverse the effects of time and went to the creek. She took a deep breath and dived into the water, feeling the magic happen as she passed through the rock passage. When she emerged, she saw that she had been transformed into a young woman.

As she walked back to the village, the grandmother's legs felt strong and sure. But when she entered her home, her granddaughter did not recognize her and tried to run away. The grandmother tried to explain who she was, but the girl accused her of being a wicked spirit.

The grandmother's heart was crushed. She loved her granddaughter more than anything and couldn't bear to be rejected by her. So, she went back

to the creek and reversed the transformation, returning to her original appearance.

From that day on, the creek lost its magic and no one was able to regain their youth. Many in Ambangga village regret that the grandmother had gone back to the creek and that eternal youth was not possible.

The moral of this story suggests that the pursuit of youth and eternal life may not bring the happiness and fulfillment that we expect it to. The joy of cheerishing grand children is one of the highest reward of life.



THE NAMELE'S CHILD



Vatimato accepted and the two of them lived happily for many years, learning to fish and farm together, and even building a canoe to explore nearby islands.

One day, they were invited to a feast in a nearby village. While they were there, Vatimato joined the dancing and absentmindedly grabbed a Namele leaf. Vatmah was heartbroken, and he left without a word. Vatimato looked for Vatmah everywhere, but he could not find him.

He returned home, feeling sad and angry with himself. He never touched a Namele leaf again, and the memory of Vatmah stayed with him forever. He was reminded of his mistake and the pain of loss each time he looked at the Namele tree in his garden.

Despite this, he never stopped loving Vatmah and hoped that he would find happiness in his life. The moral of the story is that we should think carefully before making promises, especially

when you deeply want something in return, as we may not be able to keep them and our actions can have far-reaching consequences. Vatimato had promised Vatmah he would never cut a Namele leaf, yet he was unable to keep his promise, which resulted in Vatmah leaving and never returning.

This taught Vatimato a valuable lesson about honoring his word and the importance of being mindful of his actions.



The Majestic Namele Tree of Vanuatu

The namele tree, is a famous cycad of Vanuatu. Growing very tall, its height is often very impressive. Its trunk can reach up to 10 meters (33 feet) in diameter when very old. It carries many large branches and its leaves are used for medicinal purposes.

A pair of namele leaves appears on the national flag and coat of arms. The Namele tree has a long and rich history, dating back to the time of the first settlements of Vanuatu. The local communities see it as a place of spiritual significance, home to the gods and spirits. It is a symbol of respect, peace and reverence.

The tree is generally surrounded by a number of smaller trees, which are believed to be its guardians.

The Namele Leaf serves as a powerful taboo sign. For example, a branch of Namele planted in a lagoon or on the shore will signify it is forbidden to fish. A branch of Namele planted in front of a fruit tree will signify do not harvest the fruits.

In order to be respectful of traditions, one will strictly respect these signs. It is important to note that, those restrictions are also helping the communities protect the environment and the conservation of ressources.



GOING OFF-GRID IN THE BANKS

To Vanuatu locals, the Banks Islands conjure up imagery of rugged, isolated islands with rich cultural diversity, epic hiking and stunning beaches.

ccessed by air services from Santo, the key islands for visitors are Vanua Lava, Mota Lava (and neighbouring Rah) and Gaua. Getting to The Banks requires a bit of planning to make the most of it. Take your time to explore the Banks Islands, and you'll be richly rewarded with a destination few have visited.

Gaua is the most popular of the Banks Islands. Known for its stunning landscapes with an active volcano, Vanuatu's largest lake and highest waterfall, it's brilliant for adventure seekers.

Mota Lava and Rah are small (it takes about 2.5 hours to walk around Mota Lava), though pack a punch with what they offer. Whether it's climbing Sleeping Mountain on Mota Lava, kicking back on Rah's beaches while watching snake dancing or visiting for the St Andrews & Traditional Leaf Fishing Festival, you'll find the journey is worth it.

Vanua Lava has mountains, a volcano, waterfalls and lush rainforest. Many visitors come to Vanua Lava for the Vanua Lava Festival, as well as some great hikes.

The Rah Snake Dance is unique to Rah Island and can only be performed by the local men. The dance takes place on a white sandy beach overlooking the famous Rocks of Rah. The tour begins with an introduction about the origins of the Rah Snake Dance and story behind the dances.
